The Fairness Commissioner of Ontario Hon. Jean Augustine PC, CM said that change in a society only happens when the people participate and stand up for their rights for improvements. She was describing her experience as a new immigrant from Grenada to Canada in 1960 while speaking in an exclusive interview with Arrahman Arraheem Television Network.

Recollecting her initial days in this country, Ms Augustine said that Canada in those days was a very different place to what it is today. Canada was in the process of 'nation-building' and 'identifying who we were'. As a black woman she had to experience many forms of discriminations but her childhood lessons of commitment, dedication and perseverance kept her focussed to overcome all the hurdles and obstacles in striving for an all-inclusive Canadian society. She

described this period as 'very exciting times' and felt privileged to be par of it it. Ms Augustine become the first Afro-Canadian woman to be elected to the House of Commons from the riding of Etobicoke-Lakeshore in 1993 and sat in the parliament till 2006.

Sharing the true spirit of Islam the team of Arrahman Arraheem pointed out that Chapter 49 Verse 13 of the Quran addresses all mankind and says "O mankind! We created you from a male and a female, and made you into nations and tribes, so that you may know and recognise each other. Verily the most honoured of you in the sight of Allah is the most righteous of you..." Hence considering oneself superior on the basis of colour, gender or religion is completely against the teachings of Islam. A Muslim is one who lives in peace, respects and gives rights of all people around him without any discrimination.

On Halloween paramedic crews will be driving throughout Peel neighbourhoods and reminding trick-or-treaters to be safe while out collecting treats.

PRPS was the first paramedic

service to initiate a Halloween Safety Program and distribute glow sticks. Other services have since followed suit developing similar programs based on Peel's success.

Here are some safety tips to help prepare for Halloween:

Ensure costumes are loose enough to be worn over warm clothing, but not so baggy or long that trick-or-treaters can trip on their costumes.

Choose brightly-coloured costumes that are clearly visible to motorists. For greater visibility, add reflective tape to costumes.

Makeup and face paint are safer than masks; if using a mask, choose one that allows your child to see and breathe easily.

Examine the goodies collected by your trick-or-treaters before he or she eats any.

Ensure your child knows not to take shortcuts through backyards, alleys or parks.
